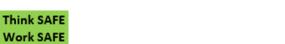

HEALTH & SAFETY INDUCTION TRAINING

1. Introduction

- * Following the implementation of the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974 and the Construction (Design & Management) Regulations (C.D.M) in 2015 more emphasis is being placed on safety in the construction industry.
- * Not only is a safe working environment essential but it is also <u>LAW</u>. The company and <u>individuals</u> concerned can be <u>prosecuted if safety negligence or a breach of the</u> regulations is proven.
- * All persons on site have a legal responsibility to conduct their activities in a safe manner.
- * It is against the law for you to endanger yourself or others by your actions or omissions.

Your Health and Safety Responsibilities

- 1. Comply with the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974 or you'll be liable for the same penalties as your employer.
- 2. You have a duty to look after yourself and others affected by what you do and don't do.
- 3. Always report any fault or defect which could endanger your health and safety.
- 4. You must comply with all safety requirements laid down by your employer.
- 5. Don't abuse or damage any PPE supplied for your safety.
- 6. Never carry out work of a dangerous nature or operate machines unless you're trained to do so.
